

Subject: Official Notice Regarding Legislative Changes Affecting Division of Consumer Protection Registrations

During the 2026 General Legislative Session, the Legislature passed [SB 38](#), which takes effect on **May 6, 2026**. This bill modifies registration and compliance requirements for the statutes enforced by the Division.

Highlighted below are some key registration changes to the **Charitable Solicitations Act**, Utah Code § 13-22-101 *et seq.* Refer to lines 1549-2126 of [SB 38](#) that pertain to Charitable Solicitations Act.

Registered Agent Requirement

- Requires applicants to designate a registered agent for service of process in the state, including name, street address, mailing address, and telephone number. See lines 1818-1823 of SB 38.

Registration Information

- Changes to what information is required to be included in an application. See lines 1799-1904 of SB 38.
- Renewal application shall be submitted at least 30 days prior to the current registration expires. See lines 1916-1918 of SB 38.

Fundraising Campaign Recordkeeping Requirements

- Professional fundraisers are no longer required to register a fundraising campaign with the Division.
- Professional fundraisers are required to maintain internal records of actual expenses, scripts, revenues, and contributions for five years after the campaign ends. See lines 2093-2126 of SB 38.

Financial Reports

- Clarifies what financial reports are required to be filed annually with the Division of Corporations and Commercial Code. See lines 1996-2020 of SB 38.

Investigative and Enforcement Powers

- Clarifies the Division's authority and the fine amount. See lines 1709-1774 of SB 38.

Denial, Suspension, or Revocation
